

Navigating the Plan

This plan includes six chapters: Land Use, Neighborhoods & Housing, Economic Development, Community Services & Facilities, Natural Environment and Transportation. Each chapter includes a vision, goals and objectives. The vision statement for each chapter broadly describes the direction the community wishes to take related to the topical area. The goal statements in each chapter stem from the vision, while the objectives (numbered) aim to accomplish the goal under which they are listed. Each goal in the plan is accompanied by a narrative, which explains the importance of the goal and how it relates to the community. Several sidebars and text boxes provide additional information on specific topics mentioned in the plan.


