# April Pollutant Challenge

### Will you help keep oil out of our waterways?

### Why are automotive fluids like oil a problem?

Petroleum-based automotive fluids, like oil and gasoline, are toxic to plants, wildlife, and people. Spills and leaky vehicles that leave spots on pavement endanger our waterways as they are easily washed into nearby storm drains and often travel, untreated, directly into our waterways. Automotive fluids are not biodegradable and have properties that make them stick to plants and animals. Once these fluids enter a waterway, they will stick around for years to come!



Automotive fluid spills can be picked up by stormwater and carried to our local materways.

### What can I do?

Vehicle maintenance! Spring is a great time of year to check your vehicle for leaks and drips. Prevention is always the best option!

If you notice your vehicle has already sprung a leak, get the issue fixed as soon as possible and use oil dry, kitty litter, or some other absorbent material to dry up spills. After absorbing, these materials should be safe to dispose of in the trash.

Have you seen a public parking area with oily sheens? What about a storm drain with odd residues? You can also help prevent oil and other automotive fluids from entering our waterways by reporting spills or illegal dumping to the Stormwater Department. #### **Report a Pollutant**

Stormwater pollutants include anything other than rain that could flow or be washed into a storm drain.
