



Flood Resilience Toolbox

Historic 1892 Flood in Goshen



View looking southwest from downtown. Businesses here reported flood damages.


May 6, 1892—three days after what newspapers describe as the event's river height crest. Note the water level in relation to landmarks still standing today.

Understanding our flood history helps the City plan for our future by strengthening risk assessment and shedding light on how land use changes can impact flooding.

For more on the flood and how it compares to other historic floods in Goshen, check out our story map: <u>arcg.is/aznu1</u> In early May of 1892, heavy rainfall in the region caused the Elkhart River to begin rising. It kept rising and crested at what evidence suggests was likely a historic high for the City (greater than 2018), but we do not have river gauge information to confirm with absolute certainty.

What we do know about the flood we have gained from research by the Goshen Historical Society using photo evidence and newspaper clippings.

These historic images are thought to have been taken by William Parfitt from the County Courthouse clock tower on
