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Year-End Statement from the Chief of the Goshen Fire Department

As Chief of the Goshen Fire Department, I am pleased to reflect on the remarkable achievements and milestones our department reached in 2024. This year has been a testament to our commitment to growth, service, and excellence as we continue to meet the needs of our ever-expanding community.

Record-Breaking Calls for Service In 2024, the Goshen Fire Department set a new record for call volume, responding to 5,552 calls. This surpassed our previous record of 5,498 calls set in 2022. The increasing number of calls reflects the continued growth of the City of Goshen and underscores the critical role our department plays in ensuring the safety and well-being of our residents.

Community Engagement and Events the Fire Department was actively involved in numerous community events and initiatives throughout the year. Highlights include:

- Participation in the Elkhart County 4-H Fair and Fair Parade, where we distributed fire safety materials.
- Engagement at the Hispanic Heritage Festival, emphasizing fire prevention and safety awareness.
- Supporting the Goshen Freedom Fest Airshow.
- Hosting and attending numerous neighborhood parties to build community relations.
- Conducting fire extinguisher training sessions for local businesses, reinforcing fire safety education in the workplace.

Educational Programs In 2024, we expanded our educational outreach through two key programs:

- **Redhawk Academy High School Firefighting Program**: This new initiative allows high school students to work toward their firefighter/EMT certifications and earn credits toward an associate degree, preparing them for careers in emergency services.
- Indiana District 2 Fire Academy: Held at our state-of-the-art training facility, this program continues to thrive, filling every session and maintaining a waiting list of eager participants.

Revisiting Our Mission and Core Values This year, our department revisited and updated our mission statement and core values to better reflect our dedication to the community and each other. Our mission now reads:

"To Positively Impact Our Community Through Service."

A committee of 12 firefighters developed new core values that define our department:

- Integrity
- Courage
- Service
- Legacy

These principles guide us in our daily duties and long-term vision.

Department Growth and Staffing In 2024, we welcomed 10 new members to our team, addressing retirements, separations, and the addition of three new positions. These hires reflect our dedication to maintaining a strong and capable workforce to meet the demands of our growing city.

Looking Ahead 2024 was an outstanding year for the Goshen Fire Department. From record-breaking call volumes to meaningful community engagement and program development, we have set a high standard for the future. 

Overview:

The Goshen Fire Department responded to 5,552 calls for service in 2024, a 7.9% Increase from 2023. Average response time for the first arriving unit on emergency calls from our dispatch to arrival on scene, was 4 minutes and 36 seconds.

The annual dollar loss from investigated fires was estimated at \$1,744,500.00 down from \$6,269,190.00 in 2023. The percent of property value saved in structure fires during 2024 was 86% compared to 78% in 2023.

The total dollar amount of property saved in 2024 was \$10,285,600.

Administration and Operations







AVERAGE RESPONSE TIME FIRE








ANALYTICS Total Volume By Day of Week - 2024

Emergency Medical Services – Asst. Chief of EMS Shane McKerchie

Division Officers: Captain Kit Castetter, Lieutenant Jon Weishaupt, Lieutenant Andrew Priem, Sergeant Lucas Wickey, Sergeant Lucas Mason, Sergeant Winston Lechlitner and Sergeant Dan Kurtz.

2024 was a year of growth for Goshen Fires EMS Division. We had a record year of patients treated by our staff completing 4506 individual patient reports. This was a 9.4% increase from 2023 with nearly 50% of these being Advanced Life Saving level calls. We placed into service our new Medex ambulance at station 3 greatly improving our overall fleet strength. New medical tools were place on each of our frontline ambulances including: IV pumps, Powered stair chairs, Cot scales for more accurate patient weighing, and for the first time ever we can administer pre-hospital broad spectrum antibiotics to reduce massive infection in patients with open fractures. In addition to equipment upgrades we also graduated 5 new paramedic students to continue the legacy of incredible EMS care.

The EMS division has made great efforts to provide improved Emergency Medical education in 2024. Members of our department attended 4 national level EMS education conferences and 2 state levels conferences bringing back information and training to keep us on the cutting edge of EMS practices. We provide comprehensive monthly training and case review for the entire department. In addition, we held an annual skills assessment of the entire department in December allowing us to evaluate our competencies and target training areas for 2025. Training and equipping our paramedics and EMT's remains a top priority ensuring we will provide exceptional medical care to the City of Goshen for years to come.


2024 also was the start of a new initiative within the City of Goshen and the EMS division with the inception of the Mobil Integrated Health team. This program with be a joint venture between the City of Goshen, the Goshen Fire Department, and the Goshen Police Department to provide an alternative response to complex cases. We will be addressing mental health issues, homeless and underserved populations, and chronic disease patients that require combined efforts for paramedics, law enforcement and social workers. We are excited for the future of this program and look forward to it kicking off early in 2025.



Winston Lechlitner completed and passed his training for his FPC certification in critical care paramedicine bringing to our team significant knowledge and care that he is passing on to the rest of the department.




















> <u>Training</u> – Assistant Chief of Training Steffen Schrock

The mission of the Goshen Fire Department is to positively impact our community through service. In order to support the mission, the Training Division strives to provide quality, purpose driven training that promotes firefighter excellence, confidence and safety. These objectives are met by designing lessons that improve the knowledge, skills and abilities or all our members.

2024 was a productive year for the Goshen Fire Department Training Division. All Goshen Firefighters were trained in disciplines that focused on the immediate risks and target hazards of our community. These disciplines include firefighting, EMS, hazardous materials operations, rope rescue, water rescue, confined space rescue, and community risk reduction. Total training man hours for 2024 equaled 16,578. A deeper breakdown of the total training hours reveals that we maintained or increased the training man hours in all of our services from 2023. Overall, the department training hours increased from 2023 by 8.5%

A number of goals and objectives were meet in 2024. The highlights include the following

- Establishment of the Goshen Fire Department Recruit Academy. The initial academy consisted of 5 recruits and was 14 weeks long. GFD's newest firefighters receive certifications in Firefighter I & II and Hazardous Materials Awareness and Operations before beginning on a battalion. At the time of this report, the 2nd academy is in full swing. This academy consists of 4 recruits and EMT B was added to the program.
- As we prepare for the future growth of Goshen we sent personnel to Airport Rescue Firefighting School in Kentucky and Hazardous Materials Technician School in Warsaw. The knowledge obtained at these classes will help build a solid foundation as we begin to improve our ability to respond to aircraft emergencies and mitigate hazmat incidents
- GFD continued improving and refining our ability to respond to emergencies in Elkhart Township. This preparation included work on pump operations and preplanning target hazards.

The Training Division will ride the momentum gained in 2024 to help us achieve the following goals in 2025:

- Continue to improve the Danny Sink Regional Training Facility
- Develop an Officer Academy for new GFD Officers
- Develop operation manuals and training drill task book


- Continue to work on an airport response plan
- Improve our hazardous materials decontamination skills





Fire Investigations – Asst. Chief of Fire Prevention Scott Thomas

In 2024, the Goshen Fire Prevention Division, under the leadership of Assistant Chief Scott Thomas, focused on enhancing compliance with fire safety standards. The division undertook various critical activities, including fire inspections, construction plan reviews, safety consulting, hazard assessment surveys, public education, and fire investigations. Given the extensive scope of these responsibilities, there was a reduction in the number of fire safety inspections conducted throughout the year. This strategic adjustment allowed the division to allocate resources more effectively, thereby improving the overall quality and impact of its fire safety compliance initiatives.

On a positive note, Scott Thomas was promoted to Assistant Chief of Fire Prevention, enabling him to dedicate his full attention to overseeing the entire division. Additionally, John Evans was promoted to Division Chief of Inspections. Chief Evans has excelled in his new role, demonstrating remarkable proficiency and dedication to mastering his responsibilities. Travis Peak was promoted to Division Chief of Education. Chief Peak heads the RedHawk Fire Academy for the Goshen Schools Career Center, teaching high school students how to become the next generation of dedicated public servants of safety.

Finally, after years of work, Goshen Fire Department now has an updated fire prevention ordinance. The ordinance was much needed to replace the previous ordinance from the 1980s. This update allows us to keep up with changes in technology and advancements in fire science. The Goshen Fire Department recently adopted third-party compliance engine software, which helps us track deficiencies in fire protection systems throughout our coverage area.

Over the last year, Goshen has seen a dramatic decrease in large-loss fires. We credit this positive development to the hard work of the fire prevention staff, the new fire prevention ordinance, and the compliance engine software. Keeping fire loss down keeps Goshen safe and helps reduce property insurance costs.

As Goshen continues to grow, we will need to be proactive in fire prevention methods, staffing, and continuing education to fulfill our mission to "positively impact our community through service"!








In 2024, our fire prevention and education initiatives made significant strides in raising awareness within the community. Key accomplishments include:

1. Community Outreach:

- Conducted fire safety/extinguisher training workshops across local schools, businesses, and community centers.
- Distributed free smoke detectors to households, ensuring families are better equipped to respond to emergencies.

2. Public Awareness:

- Pushed fire safety knowledge on social media, and print advertisements, focusing on home fire safety, and safe practices for outdoor activities.
- Increased public engagement with fire prevention tips.

Redhawk Fire Academy (2024)

The opening of the new Redhawk Fire Academy marked a milestone in our commitment to enhancing firefighter training and preparedness. Key achievements include:

1. Wortinger Training Tower

• The Academy officially opened its doors in the summer of 2024, with specialized training environments (including live fire training scenarios), and dedicated classroom spaces for firefighter education.

2. Training Programs:

• Firefighter I/II certification course, Hazmat Awareness and Operations

3. Community Impact:

• The Redhawk Fire Academy became a 1st of its kind, to deliver a true firefighting class. With a classroom setting and hands on experience and training, this provides the necessary tools and certifications for the future generation of Firefighters.

Looking Ahead

In 2025, we will continue to expand our fire prevention and education programs, with a focus on reaching communities and enhancing digital resources. The Redhawk Fire Academy will evolve, adding new specialized equipment to keep pace with emerging fire safety technologies and challenges. Together, these initiatives will foster a safer, more resilient community.
